

A new urban condition seems to be emerging in Warsaw nowadays. Among the largest European cities, the polish capital is the only one that cannot be called a historical city in the strict sense. The urban structure is characterized by medieval, post-war and contemporary buildings, but more than 90% of the built fabric is less than 70 years old — a specific mixture of both capitalist and communist failure and success. During this seminar week we will investigate and experience first-hand the potentials of modernist city planning and its architecture, but we will also explore a wide range of activities the city has to offer. The studio will have a temporary headquarters in the city centre. The group will gather there

to prepare or brief about the daily visits. The venue includes a small auditorium and a meeting room in which different lectures and other activities will take place. The different daily visits will be organised according to building typologies: towers, private houses, public spaces, embassies, etc. The program of every day will be developed with a different local expert who will join the visit and, whenever possible, the specific project architects will also be present. The students will be accommodated independently in groups of 2–4 persons. The autonomous flats are located in modernist buildings distributed within the city centre.
